Volumes on Christianity, Islam, Judaism, and Eastern Religions are now available, At completion, the series will comprise more than 450,000 pages, 900 monographs, and 10,000 archival items. The printed materials are rekeyed to more than 99.99% accuracy, while the interface allows in-depth word pattern analysis and data mining, as well as the ability to search using Arabic script and Hebrew.





Reinhold Niebuhr (1892-1971) was a reformed theologian, philosopher, and author. His collection digitized from the Library of Congress, includes correspondence, speeches, sermons, lectures, articles, book reviews, typescripts of books and articles, family papers, subject files, biographical material, bibliographies, photographs, and memorabilia reflecting Niebuhr's influence on twentieth-century theology, politics, and society and his efforts to apply religious and ethical standards to modern social and political problems including labor and race relations.

VOLUME II, ISLAM is an extensive research database of the most influential thinkers of modern Islamic theology and tradition. This volume is complete with 109,000 pages of foundational texts and contextual monographs from the late 19th century to the 2010s.

About 95% of the collection's key thinkers and authors are Muslims who come from Egypt, Gambia, India, Iraq, Iran, Morocco, Pakistan, Syria, Tanzania, and Turkey. Included are international selections of English, Arabic, and French editions of the writings.



- Several works by the controversial Turkish cleric and former Imman Fethullah Gülen, founder of the Gülen movement, including *The Essentials of the Islamic Faith, The Messenger of God: Muhammad, Reflections on the Qur'an: Commentaries on Selected Verses, The Statue of Our Souls: Revival in Islamic Thought and Activism, and more.*
- Works by Chandra Muzzafar, the Malaysian Islamic reformist and activist, including Universality of Islam.
- Contributions of Sadiq Jalal Al-Azm, a Syrian author with a focus on the relationship of the Islamic World to the West and whose works include *On Fundamentalisms, Islam: Submission and Disobedience, Is Islam Secularizable?* and *Challenging Political and Religious Taboos.*
- Over forty books from the Islamic Foundation including *The Duties of Brotherhood in Islam, Inner Dimensions of Islamic Worship,* and *Pioneers of Islamic Scholarship.*
- The forty volume set of *The History of al-Ţabarī* by SUNY Press. Completed in 1999 by a distinguished group of Arabists and historians of Islam, the annotated translation of *The History of al-Ṭabarī* is arguably the most celebrated chronicle produced in the Islamic lands on the history of the world and the early centuries of Islam.



VOLUME III, JUDAISM expands the series to include 100,000 pages of the most important works and primary sources that document the evolution of Judaism from the 1890s-2010s.





Featured Materials in Volume III, Judaism: The Markus Brann Archive

Mordechai Markus Brann (1849–1920) was a leading figure in the Science of Judaism. He taught at the Jewish Theological Seminary in Breslau, was one of the editors of the influential Monatsschrift für Geschichte und Wissenschaft des Judentums, and made intensive efforts to research Jewish history from archival sources. His large research network finds expression in his vast correspondence with hundreds of other researchers, rabbis, and philosophers, which was permanently deposited at the National Library of Israel shortly before World War II and is included in our collection for the first time in its entirety, upon completion.


Key Thinkers and Works

- Alan Watts was a British-American author, writer, and speaker who was known for his interpretation of Eastern philosophies for a Western audience. Courtesy of New World Library, works by Alan Watts in this collection include: What Is Zen?, What is Tao?, Still the Mind: An Introduction to Meditation, and Eastern Wisdom, Modern Life: Collected Talks, 1960-1969.
- Writings from Sister Nivedita, an Irish teacher, writer, activist, founder of a school, and disciple of Swami Vivekananda, including *An Indian Study of Love and Death, Cradle Tales of Hinduism, Footfalls of Indian History,* and *The Master as I Saw Him.*
- Works of Swami Abhedananda, including Abhedananda in India in 1906, An Introduction of Philosophy of Panchadasi, How to be a Yogi, and India and Her People.
- Several works by Geshe Kelsang Gyatso, Buddhist monk, meditation teacher, scholar, and author. Including: *Guide to the Bodhisattva's Way of Life* and *Essence of Vairavana, Universal Compassion: Inspiring Solutions for Difficult Time.*
- Contemporary Religions in Japan published by the International Institute for the Study of Religions, Nanzan University (1960-1970) was a scholarly Englishlanguage journal dedicated to discussing and understanding religion in Japan.




Videos have become a powerful tool for religious education, worship, and outreach, allowing scholars and students to explore various religious beliefs, practices, and traditions, showcase religious rituals and ceremonies, and offer spiritual guidance and inspiration. This set of religious films and documentaries will provide students with a deeper understanding of the social and political context surrounding practicing religion in the modern world. It dissects how different faith and belief systems have evolved during the 20th century and how they intertwine with our current daily life, from navigating personal relationships to contemplating our mortality and processing death.

Content Highlights


- Secular People on a Mission: In this documentary, we share the daily life of several secular people on mission, from their training to their involvement in the field with very different populations, as well as their work in close collaboration with parish priests. They entrust us with their questions, their difficulties, their joys and tell us how, throughout their mission, their Faith never ceases to flourish.
- Beyond the Pulpit (Rabbi William Kramer): A sensitive portrait of one of the most forward-thinking theologians and scholars of his time, Rabbi William Kramer (1920 2004).
- Exile The Dalai Lama and His People: This classic documentary tells the Dalai Lama's historic story and focuses on the holy man's attempts to perpetuate the Tibetan culture. We see rare footage of the Dalai Lama in Dharamsala, northern India; witness his trips to refugee camps in India and Pakistan; see examples of the century-old Tibetan tradition of Thangka painting; and gain a comprehensive picture of this holy man's life—in exile.
- Islam: The Hajj (Saudi Arabia): This documentary takes us to Islam's holiest mosque to witness the Fifth Pillar of Islam, a once-in-a-lifetime pilgrimage to Makkah (Mecca), Saudi Arabia, the Hajj, a journey that begins on the 8th day of the month of Dhul Hijjah (in the Islamic calendar), and to hear perspectives on the non-radical meaning of Islam from a variety of pilgrims from nations around the world, as well as Muslim leaders.
